Like every weekend here on the Peninsula there is a lot going on competing for folks' attendance so I wasn't sure if anyone would show up. And, in true Methodist fashion, at about ten minutes before start time the parking lot was pretty empty, and I wondered who was going to all of those hotdogs we had purchased. but then folks started trickling in and I saw a few musicians getting out of their cars carrying instruments and I began to breathe ing, she approached me and said how ima little easier. I held off starting until closer to two-thirty so everyone could get situated and then off we went with our Spirit Singers warming up the crowd with three of our favorites. And then we got to jamming.

Over the course of the next two hours, I saw people coming and going as they pleased, and the crowd was very appreciative of our music with some folks joining in and singing along on the familiar songs we played. But what I also observed was the networking that was going on. People who don't attend our church showed up and I could see them talking with church members about our mission

orts and how they could help. Well, timis everything, because I learned earlier that morning from Jean Holtz that Bayside Housing and Services was going to move the twelve tiny homes from Pat's Place in

Port Townsend to our church property, doubling the number of tiny homes in our backyard. (I had previously had a conversation with Gary Keister from Bayside about this possibility but wasn't sure when it was going to happen, if at all.) I announced this news to the crowd and told them that what we were doing was even more important than ever as more people would be coming to us for assistance. The folks in attendance were genuinely impressed as we received some very positive feedback. We collected four cartloads of food and \$492.00 in cash, but more importantly, we raised awareness of the housing challenges and what one church could do with the help and support of others who care and want to do something. As one of the fiddle players was leavpressed she was with our efforts to take on social justice issues. I thanked her for her comments and for coming to share her gift of music. Don't be surprised if she shows up some Sunday morning to play a few gospel fiddle tunes.



Housing and the Tiny Home Village.



Missions Possible!

It was my honor and privilege to travel to Stanwood Saturday, August 17th to represent Community United Methodist Church to talk about our missions' programs: The Clothes Closet, the Food Pantry, and the Soup Kitchen—just to name a few.

I love love love, our pastor's sense of humor by naming the workshops "Mission Possible" as a take on the old TV Show Mission Impossible changed to be Mission Possible.

I was told in advance that I had six people signed up for my workshop, but I had six people who attended the first one and eight—possibly more who attended the second session. We hardly had enough room in our small room.

I started off telling them about who we are and a little history about our missions over the last 20 years starting with the land lease to OlyCAP to build the South Seven—Senior Housing. I told them about the size of our church and the small steps we took to get to where we are today. Starting with saying yes to our allowing the tiny homes to be built in our parking lot, to moving them to our property, to discovering that they had other needs.

We had great conversations with each other and one of the participants had already talked to Scott at the Annual Conference. They really loved Scott's creativity with making up names of months to collect things that we need such as Soctober, Underweary, and Newvember. They loved the stories about our great volunteers who help our participants get exactly what they need and the partnerships that we have with other churches. In the end, people felt inspired to start small and take it as the Holy Spirit leads them.

It was a long day, but well worth the effort.

New from Bayside

Bayside is finding more ways to help people who are experiencing homelessness in Jefferson County

EMERGENCY SHELTER: Bayside is managing the downtown P.T. shelter funded by Jefferson Co.

JC MASH Free Clinic: Bayside is raising funds to support the new, full time position of Medical Director, who will lead efforts to expand services with an emphasis on mental health.

WOODLEY PLACE. Renovations to 17 rooms are nearly completed; it's first permanent supportive housing tenants will move in this fall.

COMPUTER LABS. Bayside is installing three computer labs for use of tenants at four sites with support from multiple foundation and tribal grants.

COMBININB PAT'S PLACE AND PETER'S PLACE: Bayside is moving the tiny shelters at Pt.Townsend's Pat's place to property adjacent to Peter's Place in Pt Hadlock and upgrading the shared kitchen and sanitation facilities.

VINCE'S VILLAGE: With an \$8.7M grant from the state, Bayside will break ground on 23+ units of affordable housing on the property currently occupied by Pat's Place. Vince's Village will be open for tenancy by early 2026

9th STREET PURCHASE: Bayside closed on a house next to the site of Vince's Village to be rented as affordable housing; an adjacent vacated street may allow Bayside to construct up to 66 more units of affordable housing.

SAN JUAN PROPERTY: Bayside has signed a purchase and sale agreement to purchase the property at the corner of F street and San Juan in Pt.Townsend. We have received a portion of the purchase price and hope to raise the balance in order to close the sale by the end of the year.

STARRETT HOUSE: The lower rooms offer extended-stay-hotel-as-shelter; the rest is operated as a B&B (proceeds pay the mortgage) and event venue. Bayside is raising funds for re-roofing and exterior painting.

BAYSIDE SKILLS CENTER: To build the employment prospects of people experiencing homelessness and members of our community, Bayside will offer authentic career experiences and practical training in the culinary, hospitality and restaurant industries beginning this fall.

PORT HADLOCK COMMUNITY UNITED METHODIST CHURCH; has loaned property for Pat's/Peter's Place. Bay-side is raising funds to purchase more property for new units of affordable housing.

Before COVID arrived and drastically changed the way we do things we used to have an annual gathering called Roots and Wings. It was a one-day event designed for all the churches to gather, mingle, network, and attend various breakout sessions. It was a day of worship, singing, connecting, and refreshing. Well, now that COVID has waned Roots and Wings is back in a new and improved format. This year Roots and Wings will be held for three consecutive months in different locations around the Puget Sound Missional District, in Stanwood, Sequim, and Issaquah.

I want to talk to you about the session to be held in Sequim on Saturday, September 14th which is the one that will be the most convenient for us to attend. What I would like for our church is to have several members attend with an eye on going to several of the breakout sessions that might most interest us. Oh yeah, our church will be presenting a breakout session entitled: Missions are Possible where I will talk about how missions are possible for small churches on a limited or no budget scale. I've looked at a few of the sessions and think we should have someone at the following:

101 on Church Media. Rev. Greg Reffner, Pastor of Brownsville and Tracyton UMCs will be giving a session on media technology. Greg says that media technology in worship is one of the most powerful tools at our disposal. It is also the most frustrating! Really? In the workshop he'll explore with the attendees how sound and video technology work and how to operate it. They will have actual sound and video equipment to practice with. With our efforts and struggles I think this session is a must.

Empowering Laity Through Lay Servant Ministries. Every church and every pastor need all the help he or she can get. This is how I got my start. Rev. Sheila Miranda will talk about how these courses on Lay Servan Ministries offer laity opportunities for both spiritual growth and skills training. The workshop will give participants an overview of class offerings, certification programs and processes. You don't have to become a Certified Lay Minister like I am, but you can gain valuable insight on how you can more fully serve your congregation. As we continue to grow and expand our ministries, I think this is a session well worth attending and I can use all the help I can get!

United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) I met the presenters at Annual Conference, and they are very knowledgeable and their outreach and ability to tap into resources is unlimited. They are disaster response coornators and will help participants learn how to coordinate, communicate and prepare for natural disasters through our connection. I believe that when a natural disaster hits our community people will naturally seek out assistance from our church because that is what we do. Should we be thinking bigger?

Anyway, there are others and if you google the Pacific Northwest Conference of the United Methodist Church you can navigate their website and look for Roots and Wings to learn more. Additionally, there is a place where you can register in advance for the Sequim gathering. If you need help navigating the page or signing up Kathi and I can help you. I hope you will join me in this great opportunity to gather and learn from others what all we can do to further make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.



Debra Ison: Path to Joy

September 30, Upper Room

Six years ago, I learned that I would become a widow. My husband's diagnosis meant that over time, his simple pleasures—golf, fishing, throwing a ball with a grandchild—would become impossible. We accepted each day as it came, celebrating the good days and comforting each other on the bad ones. The final four months of his life I was his full-time caregiver. It was the hardest thing I have ever done.

My husband's death brought an end to his suffering, and I was grateful for that. But for me, it was the beginning of being alone and missing the man I had shared life with for 49 years. The intensity of my grief surprised me since I had know this loss was coming for several years. This new form of grief filled me with loneliness and a sense of extreme loss.

I discovered, however, that no matter how unhappy I was with my circumstances, I was **never** alone. Friends were always available and were very supportive. And God comforted me. I turned to scripture and found God's love on every page. I prayed and felt the Holy Spirit beside me. I turned to nature for solace and rediscovered the majesty of God's creation. Gradually, I found the joy that was dwelling within me all along—the joy of knowing Christ as my Savior.
